CHAIR'S MESSAGE Roger Skillings '68

This year we celebrate the 150th anniversary of the creation of the Crown Colony of British Columbia. It is also the 132nd year of BC's oldest high school: classes began at



Vic High in 1876, only five years after the colony became Canada's sixth province. Three school buildings and many thousands of graduates later, Vic High is still a unique and special place.

We learned last year that there was a Vic High Alumni Association as early as 1903. The present Association dates from 1976, when it emerged as a legacy of the school's centennial celebrations. Thanks to fundraising begun that year, the VHS Alumni Association now has over \$200,000 in endowment funds. In the past year alone, we distributed \$8000 in scholarships and bursaries to VHS students and a further \$3000 to support school programs.

Although the Association is run entirely by volunteers, there are costs associated with its operation. These include producing the newsletter, maintaining the website, renewing insurance for the bus we donated to the school, and preserving the Vic High Archives (another legacy of the '76 Centennial). The Association depends on regular

VIC HIGH IN THE NEWS

Recently there have been a flurry of Vic High stories in the local press – testimony to the energetic staff and creative students at the school! From the pages of the *Times Colonist*:

September 14, 2007: "Ugly duckling destined to be a sleek Spider Series" with follow-up stories on November 16 and February 8, 2008.

Teacher Kevin Blecic and his autobody students are restoring a 1979 Fiat Spider to as-new condition. Once restored, the car will be sold and the proceeds will help provide new equipment for the program, which is one of only two in the province. Many of its graduates are offered jobs as soon as they leave Grade 12.

October 20, 2007: "Rock survivor: A new Victoria

studio honours B.J. Cook, a musical pioneer who did it her way"

A new recording studio at Vic High will be named for B.J. Cook, who once sang leads with rockabilly star Ronnie Hawkins and with top-ten band Skylark. Cook, who survived a rough-and-tumble career in music, grew up in Victoria and returned to live here in the 1990s. She now enjoys mentoring young musical talent at Vic High.

October 23, 2007: "Hairdo High: Victoria school puts beauty salon into curriculum"

Art teacher and hairdresser Pam Murray presides over Vic High's brand-new teaching salon. "We've had a few students drop out and come back just for this program," says Vice-Principal Maureen Munro.

Principal's Message

My teaching roots go back to 1980 when I came to Vic High as a student teacher. In 2003 I returned to Vic High as Vice-Principal, and became Principal in 2006. The school has a long and



distinguished history of exceptional students, teachers and leaders. We are inspired by these legacies, and we feel a great sense of pride to be able to build on them. I've had the privilege of meeting some of Vic High's dedicated former teachers and students through the VHS Alumni Association, which continues the long tradition of leadership and support for this unique and wonderful school.

Graduates from decades ago would be amazed at some of the innovative programs to be found in modern-day Vic High. We've had a great deal of press this year on our auto body program, which is one of only two in the province. Carrying on Vic High's remarkable tradition of multicultural diversity, we have a First Nations Studies 12 course in operation, and a First Nations English 12 course in development. New to our school this year is a career-oriented hairdressing course, with an in-school teaching salon – a great resource for keeping some students in school. Also new this year is a French Immersion program which has begun with a grade nine class, and it will expand next year to grade ten. Two of our Science teachers are developing a new

marine science program, and obtained a \$25,000 grant from the Mitchell Odyssey Foundation to implement this program over the next five years.

Our rugby program under the leadership of Clayton Daum is experiencing a renaissance. The past three years have seen a rebuilding phase, and now our Titans are practicing hard for the upcoming season. Our coaches tell me that we have a very good chance to perform well in league play with the talent and teamwork that we have. This year's Titans are a team to watch for exciting rugby.

Besides our athletic, academic and career-oriented programs, the arts have always been a vital part of life at Vic High. In December we held our annual Celebration of the Arts evening, attended by about 800 people. Featured were painting, drawing and photography displays in the corridors; drama, dance and concert band performances in the auditorium; and the celebrated Vic High R&B Band in the music room – powerful demonstrations of the incredibly talented students and dedicated staff at the school. The R&B Band has also received a lot of press recently: it was the subject of a short documentary *Sounds Like Motown* that aired on Bravo, and a full-length version *Motown High* that opened this year's Victoria Film Festival.

The Alumni Association's interest and support for Vic High are extremely important to today's students and staff. They serve to remind us what a prominent role Vic High has played in Victoria's and British Columbia's history and what strong legacies we have to uphold.

October 23, 2007: "Vic High Sets Motown Jumpin': Mom films story of legend's bond with school band"

In 2005 filmmaker Barbara Hager was a parent chaperone on a trip to Detroit where students in Eric Emde's Vic High R&B Band were mentored by Motown legend Martha Reeves. Inspired by the experience, Hager produced a documentary on the bond that developed between the teenagers and the superstar. *Sounds Like Motown* premiered on Bravo in October. A longer version of this inspirational story, entitled *Motown High*, later premiered at the Victoria Film Festival.

December 31, 2007: "Teacher's focus on First Nations earns praise"

Vic High teacher Anne Tenning was a finalist this fall for a Governor General's Award, given to top Social Studies teachers by Canada's National History Society. Ms Tenning, 32, is a graduate of the school

(VHS '93) and a member of the Chemainus First Nation. She has helped develop First Nations Studies 12, described by former students as a great course, taught by a great teacher.

February 2, 2008: "Vic High mechanics going green: Class hopes province will help pay for electric conversion kit"

Automotive teacher Mike Grew has written to Premier Campbell requesting \$15,000 to buy a kit that will convert a pickup truck from gasoline power to electric. Leading the automotive class project is Marie Shuman, who is also a member of the school's environment club. In the long term, Mr Grew thinks his classes can produce the conversion kits themselves.

More Alumni Stars In The Vhs Galaxy



Vic High's most famous golfer, **Bill Wakeham** VHS '59, has been inducted into the BC Golf Hall of Fame. As a junior, he played at Uplands Golf Club, home of a number of VHS junior golfers. Since his first victory in 1957, Bill has racked up numerous championships and has represented BC and Canada in international competition. His mantelpiece sags with silver trophies. As a sixteen-

year-old, he won the Victoria City Junior Championship and, shortly thereafter, the BC Junior. His final victory of note came 33 years later at the 1980 Canadian PGA Pro-Am held in the Dominican Republic. Earlier that year he had won the West Coast Open. His national and international fame began to rise in the late 1960s. In 1968 and 1969, he was BC Open Champion and, in 1970, Newfoundland Champion. He won the BC Amateur twice and then competed in the World Amateur Cup, America's Cup and the Commonwealth Golf Matches in Australia. Turning pro, he qualified to play on the PGA Tour in 1969. His achievements (and stories) are legion and his reputation is legendary. He still competes in the annual Cedar Hill Open, in which he has been a feature for more than 40 years. You can find him at Royal Oak Golf Club, where he is Head Pro. We salute him and send our congratulations.

Hats are off, too, to noted historian and biographer, **Maria Tippett** VHS '62. In addition to her many prize books about artists and cultural figures of the Canadian scene, including those on two subjects who had



connections with Victoria High, Emily Carr and Bill Reid, she has recently had published *Portrait in Light and Shadow: the Life of Yousuf Karsh* (Toronto: House of Anansi, 2007). Karsh has been rightly hailed as "the Rembrandt of photography", and

Maria's portrait of him leaves no doubt this is true. She recounts his early life as an immigrant living in Ottawa in the 1930s, and how he rose to fame by his ability to reveal what he felt to be the inner power of his subjects. His famous portrait of Winston Churchill places Karsh in exalted status for all time, along with his portraits of such celebrated figures as Elizabeth II, Ernest Hemingway, Elizabeth Taylor, Humphrey Bogart and Eleanor Roosevelt. This is a must book for students of Canadian cultural history and yet another feather in Maria's literary hat. She now lives part-time in Victoria and on Pender Island, venturing farther away to England from time to time. She is married to the distinguished British historian Peter Clarke, a Canadian and author of *The Last Thousand Days of* the British Empire (London; Penguin, 2007).

Speaking of historians and their work, **Barry Gough** VHS '56, has added to his publication credits with the fast-selling *Fortune's a River: The*

Collision of Empires in Northwest America (Madeira Park, BC: Harbour Publishing, 2007). As the noted reviewer and sailor Martyn Clark wrote in the Victoria Times Colonist, Barry is the principal exponent of Canadian maritime history. He has written widely about



Canadian lakes, rivers and waters. *Fortune* has recently been nominated for two prestigious book awards for excellence in non-fiction: the Nereus Writer's Trust and BC Book Awards. Barry has recently returned to Victoria from Waterloo, Ontario, where he was Professor of History and University Research Professor at Wilfrid Laurier University. A former member of VHS staff (1964-65), he shares the distinction of being both a graduate and a teacher at Vic High with his father, John, who was later Superintendent of Schools, School District 61, 1947-1966.
