



LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR ATTENDS VICTORIA HIGH SCHOOL LIBRARY AND AUDITORIUM DEDICATION CEREMONY

On the afternoon of November 5, 2003, a memorable ceremony took place in the Victoria High School Auditorium, an event made even more memorable by the gracious presence of Her Honour, The Honourable Iona Campagnolo, Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia. The VHS Alumni Association joined with Principal Keith Forshaw, staff members, and students to recognize and honour two of the most remarkable figures in our 127 year history: the VHS Library received the name of H.L. (Harry) Smith and the School Auditorium, that L.J. (Lawrie) Wallace. The late Harry Smith (my father) was represented by family members, whereas Lawrie was present in person with Lois and their daughters to bask in a well deserved moment of public adulation. Best of all, the students of the School – now again grades 9 to 12 – turned out in force to witness and rejoice in the powerful energy of the Vic High tradition.

The Honourable Iona Campagnolo was quite wonderful. Not only did she meet informally with invited guests before and after the ceremony, but she gave a concise and elegant speech to the packed auditorium. B.C. has never had a more articulate Lieutenant

Governor, and she was able to share some personal memories of her association with Lawrie Wallace during his distinguished career in public service.

Duncan Lorimer, the last “career” Principal of Victoria High, delivered a fine tribute to Harry Smith, Principal from 1934 to 1955 and staff member for a record 41 years. Harry Smith hired that young science teacher; he and Dunc soon formed a mutual admiration society. Duncan’s speech was eloquent, warm and humorous, and his words were much appreciated.

It was my privilege to be asked to express a tribute to Lawrie, my Grade 11 math teacher and a lifelong friend. What a joy to be able to share such a moment with a throng of present-day students! Seldom have I had such a good

audience; I apologize to Jack Lowther if I took a few cheap shots at Mt. Doug in order to win over those terrific kids. Here are the closing words of my speech, spoken directly to Lawrie Wallace:

After you had staged every centennial under B.C.'s never-setting sun, you capped it with the glorious Vic High Centennial of 1976. Personally, I regard it as your best-ever celebration, and I have a hunch that you might agree. You and Dunc Lorimer got me involved, quite against my better judgment, but no one has ever said "no" to Lawrie Wallace. It turned out to be one of my lifetime highlights, a magnificent event that showed our community the power and the energy and the abiding legacy of democratic public education. It was a love-in like no other, and it launched a new era in the life of this historic School. Not the least of its spin-offs was the Victoria High School Alumni Association, an organization that keeps alive the grand tradition.

To students here today, I want you to know that Lawrie Wallace is truly "Mr. Victoria High". He and Lois once lived in Oak Bay, but wisely bought their present house on Fairfield Road to ensure their children a respectable Vic High education. I think it was Bill Garner who said that when Lawrie nicks his chin shaving in the morning, the blood runs Black and Gold. Our School has never had a more constant, faithful, and enthusiastic supporter. The caption on this commemorative photograph of Lawrie Wallace wraps it up in seven words:

GIFTS THAT MAKE A DIFFERENCE SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES AT WORK

Vic High continues to have a proud tradition of scholarship shown in the awards that its students win. Last year, 28 students from Vic High were Provincial Scholars. Some students won even more prestigious honours. Just to give two examples, Tamina Rioux won a Millennium Scholarship, while Sandra Andersen attended a pre-university summer program at Brown University in the Ivy Leagues on a scholarship.

We can take pride in these accomplishments and congratulate the students for the outstanding results of their hard work. However, the story of Vic High's awards does not end there. The Alumni Association, as well as individual alumni, reunion years and special groups like the 125th Anniversary Alumni Orchestra have all contributed to a vital and generous scholarship and bursary program for the school.

The Alumni Association has tried not to duplicate the major awards given out by the Province and other major donors. Instead, we have focussed on hard-working students who have not won major scholarships and on students in the Career Prep courses at Vic High.

Last year the Alumni Association gave over \$6,000 to students for their commitment and success in subjects as diverse as Computers and Information Technology, Human Services, Biology, Journalism, Mathematics and Coaching.

The Biology Scholarship winner, Natalie Arsenau, is typical in her commitment to her community – active in the Environment Club and the Grad Committee at Vic High, she also volunteered at the Pacific Forest Centre and Folkfest - and is attending UVic this year. Elaine Iversen won a business award and is now at Camosun in their business program. She hopes to continue her business focus and become an accountant.

To get a sense of the difference that the scholarships can make, here is part of a letter from a recent award winner who had secured an apprenticeship:

I will be attending my first six-week course at BCIT in September. I will be using the money that you have given me towards schooling supplies and specialty tools for the machining trade. I am grateful for people like you who help young graduates like me who know we are capable of starting a career young. In the future, I hope to contribute financially to a fund that supports high school graduates in the trades area.

Finally, we know that as our society changes, new needs develop. As surprising as it may seem to alumni from other times, as many as 65 students at the school are living independently, usually by force of circumstance rather than by choice. Fortunately, we have members of the Vic High family who stepped in to help. In 2001, the father of a Vic High alumnus established a memorial fund to honour his late wife by providing the principal with discretionary money to aid students who were in particular need. This fund provides \$100 per month to a student as long as he or she stays in school. Recognizing and helping these students as they struggle with difficult circumstances may make the biggest difference of all.

The Victoria High School Archives are now splendidly housed in part of the former Home Economics area at the east end of the ground floor, near the Vining Street entrance. The room is open to students and the public every Tuesday morning from 9 to 12 during the school year.

Regular volunteers (all retired) are Jim Connor, 28 years as a School District 61 employee, with 12 years as Vic High's Chief Engineer; Frank Taylor (VHS 1955), formerly Capital Plumber for School District 61; and Peter Smith (VHS 1949), 38 years on faculty at UVic. All three are passionate about Victoria's heritage; Jim and Frank are experts on local industrial history. Students seem to love the room, and they can easily persuade Jim to give them guided tours of hidden areas in the building. Alumni visitors are always welcome.



A special project this past year was the installation of the historic VHS steam engine – once used to compress air for the school's heating system – as a stationary exhibit on the fourth floor. Jim had lovingly restored this machine in 1991, and it was relocated to make room for the new elevator shaft. Many thanks to Principal Keith Forshaw and to School Board carpenters Paul Brown and Peter Roland.

BACK TO THE FUTURE

Principal's Message – Keith Forshaw

Vic High has changed. The change, however, is a little bit like “going back to the future”. Vic High now has over 1100 students from grades 9 through 12. This change is directly related to a Greater Victoria School Board initiative to “reconfigure” the school district. The District is now more than half way through changes which will result in every elementary school enrolling students from kindergarten to grade 5, middle schools enrolling students from grades 6 to 8 and secondary schools enrolling students in grades 9 through 12.

The results of the reconfiguration have been very good for Vic High. Many Vic High Alumni fondly remember the days when the school was “1500 strong”. During the 1980’s and early 1990’s Vic High was apparently anything but “1500 strong”. In fact, the student enrollment dropped below 400 students and the reputation of the school was not what it once was.

During the 1990’s, the school worked hard to successfully change Vic High’s reputation. But in September 2003, when Vic High re-opened its doors to grades 9 and 10 and once again became a grade 9 –12 school, things changed. In order to accommodate hundreds more students than had been enrolled for decades, modifications and improvements to the facility were required. More equipment, supplies, furniture and teaching material were needed. Eight new classrooms were created

(including three computer labs). Hundreds of student desks, dozens of teachers’ desks and thousands of pounds of books were rounded up and shipped to the school. School district staff have worked with loving care on all of the building projects. Historical style and colours have been honored. The school facility looks very good indeed – both inside and out!

The academic program at the school is very strong. A disproportionately high number of students win provincial scholarships and bursaries. The staff continue to effectively assist students who are experiencing academic, social or emotional problems. Our Fine Arts program makes news around the city. The Industrial Education department continues to be well respected throughout the province. With the grade 9’s and 10’s being part of the school again, we are starting to see our sports teams surging ahead. Our girls’ field hockey team just won back the May Tulley Shield that has been absent from Vic High since 1991. Our junior boys’ basketball team recently finished second in “the City’s”.

The students who are attending Vic High are the most culturally, religiously and racially diverse body of students on Vancouver Island.

As a group, they are incredibly respectful of the history and values that Vic High represents. Students are proud to report “I go to Vic High”.

I invite you to come by the school sometime. Enjoy a tour of the school and meet some of our very energetic students!
